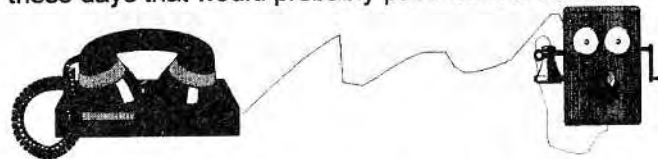

Laws changed – but not much to worry about

A new duplicate bridge Law book will come into use on October 1. How will this affect you? In many ways, not as much as you might fear. Play will still go clockwise, and bridge will still be a game for four players!

The Laws of Bridge are produced by the World Bridge Federation (WBF) and are used throughout the world. Over the last few months, I have seen a number of references to the ACBL Laws (or some term that means the same) but this is a misapprehension. These are international Laws. There are a few Laws (very few) that allow options in different zones in the world, and interpretation is not quite the same throughout the world, and the Laws are translated into other languages, but there is only one set of Laws worldwide.

These are the Laws of Duplicate Bridge. Rubber Bridge has its own Law book, also worldwide, and it tends to be revised in between Duplicate Laws revisions. So the next Rubber Law book should appear in about 2002.

The first thing to note about these new Laws is that the Law numbers are the same, Law 25 remaining as Law 25, except occasionally a new section has been added or one deleted. A quick glance at the new Law book would probably lead one to think it was unchanged, but this is far from the truth. There are a lot of minor revisions. I shall not mention them much, because there is little interest in attempts to clean up wording. I bring to your attention the changes that seem most important.

Free Copy of New Laws for every Club

At the council meeting on 7th September 1997, it was decided to send one copy of the new law book, free of charge to every affiliated club in Wales.

They will be despatched to your Club Secretary when received.

They are:

- Unauthorised Information: when a call or play is withdrawn by the offending side the information of that call or play is and remains unauthorised (not so under the current Laws).
- You can ask questions about individual calls in the auction, and about other relevant calls that could have been made but were not.
- If you change an inadvertent call without pause for thought, that is OK, so long as partner has not called. But if you attempt to change it otherwise, a dreadfully complicated Law comes into effect, and you may find yourself playing for a maximum on the board of 40%!
- Insufficient bids cannot be corrected without penalty if the corrected bid would normally be conventional.
- One for the Europeans: if you establish a revoke by a defender asking "Having none?" the card is corrected, but the penalty still applies; in the ACBL this is not illegal at the moment.
- If an offender could have known that a dubious action (e.g. hesitating over whether to peter with a doubleton) might work to his advantage then a TD can adjust in any situation. He does not need to accuse anyone of cheating: he simply adjusts.

Scratching about



At the Welsh Foursomes I opened the East hand 1NT, partner's 2♦ transfer was doubled, and I re-bid 2♥, confirming heart support. Being teams partner took a rosy view of his hand and raised to 3, I looked at my unattractive diamond suit and bid game anyway. "Teams" has a lot to answer for.

Although the jack was master in dummy, I was certain that south would be ruffing. Aware that I had a probable club loser as well, it was decision time. How were the trumps?

If north had the ♥Q, I could ruff with the ♥10, but I would need the ♥Q to drop in 2 rounds as I haven't the entries to take the finesse. If south had the ♥Q, I could be over-ruffed unless I ruffed high.

I now considered North's 10♦; this looked like a signal for spades, if the spade finesse was working, I was making if the ♥Q was with S. I decided to play for that layout and ruffed with the ♥K.

South discarded on the diamond, my 10♥ continuation won, another heart finesse to the 9♥ held.

I now ran the Q♠, which held, J♠ covered by the king, a spade ruff dropped the 10, and the last trump could be drawn. A club to the A meant that the losing club could be discarded on the 8♠.

11 tricks and 10 imps rolled in now. Time to go back into hibernation.

Partnership Agreements – Have you discussed?

My regular partner and I play transfers over 1NT, so with a five card major opposite 1NT, partner bids 2D to show Hearts, and 2H to show Spades. Its up to me what I do next, I can either complete the transfer and bid the known 5 card suit, or break the transfer if I have a fit and a good hand.

Every now and then, the opponents wander into the auction, usually with a double of 2D or 2H, often intended as lead directing, sometimes as takeout. Has your regular partnership discussed what happens next?

Clearly if you love partner's suit, and were going to break the transfer anyway, you will still do that, but you now have new options as well.

We have the following agreement:-

Redouble	I have a good holding in the doubled suit.
2 partner's	I have got at least 3.
Pass	I haven't got 3 of your suit.

Armed with this information partner can decide what to do next, (my partner usually bids his five card suit at the speed of light, and thanks the opponents for intervening, since now he gets to play the hand).

This article springs to mind after a hand at Cardiff last Thursday.

Sitting South holding : ♠Qx, ♥KQJx, ♦Kxxx, ♣Qxx,

I opened 1NT second to speak. Partner bid 2H transfer, this was alerted and East doubled to show hearts (he thought!). West alerted the double.

This hand falls well and truly into our redouble category, and the blue card hit table. West, who generally plays these doubles over 1NT as take out, bid 2S, not ashamed to show his suit. North was well pleased with the way things were going, and doubled. East reviewed the auction and the backs of the cards and then redoubled for rescue. At this point West decided 3C might be a better spot. North / South were in the swing of doubling by now, and when the smoke cleared, chalked up 1100.

North South were fortunate, having had their system discussion about two weeks earlier, (too recent to forget), and North was happy to double a black suit because he knew there wasn't an escape into hearts. East West (internationals, who will remain anonymous) fell foul of not having discussed whether their takeout double meant the same thing if you were already a passed hand. Despite this disaster East West laughed about it instead of strangling each other, a good example to us all!

TOURNAMENT DIRECTOR ASSESSMENT
