

Dear Editor

Graham Shaw's letter in the Spring Newsletter ("The Lower Ranks") voices a concern which has been raised a number of times in the past few years, and I am grateful to Graham for suggesting one way in which this concern might be addressed.

Most National competitions are, of course, open to all members, and we should perhaps not be surprised when the better players win them. Area Associations run a number of limited-masterpoint events, and it is also not unheard of for other Area competitions to be won by "ordinary" players. I should, however, be happy to consider running a national event on a handicap or restricted entry basis if room can be found in the Calendar, and if it would be supported in sufficient numbers to defray expenses (members' subscriptions do not in fact cover the cost of administration, and all members are subsidised by the profits from congresses and competitions, the cost of which is borne largely by those who regularly enter competitive events). If any members have a suggestion as to the form such an event should take, and where it should be held to attract the maximum entry, I shall be only too glad to hear from them.

Sadly, the non-green-pointed congresses that were the traditional starting point for people taking their first steps in the tournament arena are dying due to lack of support, as increasingly people do not want to play outside their clubs. Many are happy simply to play one or two evenings a week; others play in qualifying heats in the hope that they might, by good luck or good play, outwit the experts and find themselves with an unexpected trophy on the sideboard. Those who aspire to compete seriously for National trophies expect to work hard for their (usually meagre) winnings.

Finally, I am not sure that most members expect to gain anything beyond the satisfaction of finding a good opening lead and taking pleasure in the social side of the game. If, however, members believe that Council should be paying more attention to the needs of ordinary players, they must tell us what those needs are, and how they can best be met. Constructive suggestions are always welcome. But please don't simply say not enough is being done, without applying some thought to what *should* be done, and how, and who should be doing it.

Welsh Cup 2001

The holders, led by Filip Kurbalija of Cardiff, have retained the Welsh Cup. In a 64-deal final held in Cardiff they beat the team led by Laura Woodruff of Bridgend 152-73.

In a unique achievement, one member of the winning team, Tim Rees, becomes current holder of the Teams Championships of Britain (the Gold Cup), England (the Crockford's Cup) and Wales. Rees was born in Wales and is resident in England. Patrick Jourdain, registering his twelfth win in the Welsh Cup, sets a record previously shared with Mike Hirst of Cardiff on 11 wins. The Woodruff team included David Burn, a member of the England team that reached the semi-finals of last year's Olympiad.

International Round-up

Camrose

On 26/27 May 2001, in the match postponed because of the foot and mouth crisis, held at St. Malachy's College, Belfast, the Republic of Ireland beat Northern Ireland by 49-41 (5-25, 21-9, 23-7), insufficient to overtake Wales in the table.

Final table: 1st: England 232; 2nd Scotland 195; 3rd: Wales 170; 4th: Republic of Ireland 162; 5th: Northern Ireland 128.

Nations Cup

At the Bonn Nations Cup held on 23/24th May 2001, the team invited from Wales finished third in its Pool ahead of Norway (Helgemo/Helness, Grotheim/Aa) and England (Burn/Callaghan, Liggins/Fawcett), and eighth overall from 18 national teams. In the Round Robin the Welsh team won six matches and lost only to France and Denmark. Team: Tim Rees & Patrick Jourdain; Filip Kurbalija & Mike Pownall.

In the final between the two Pool winners: France beat Belgium. Meanwhile, the other 16 teams played a further three matches against teams from the other pool:

European Championships, Tenerife, June 2001

A fortnight in Tenerife might suggest sun, sea and sangria. Your correspondent has, however, to report that enjoyable and instructive though the chance to participate in these Championships might have been, it was also jolly hard work. Nine hours a day on *very* hard chairs in a playing room reduced to Arctic temperatures by the very efficient air-conditioning, followed by a late-night review of the next opponents' systems, meant some of us returned home more exhausted than when we left. The venue was on the seafront, but the nearest I got to the blue stuff was a view from the apartment window.

Wales's team prospects got off to a bad start when the Women's Team's coach, Ken Richardson, had to be left behind at Cardiff Airport. An over-zealous check-in clerk informed him, wrongly, that he required a visa because a) he was born in India and b) Tenerife is not in the EC. A trip to the Spanish Embassy and a night in a Gatwick hotel later, he finally boarded a flight two days late.

The Open team improved upon their performance in Maastricht in September, not only by beating Italy, the eventual winners, 22-8 but by drawing with the strong teams from Poland and the Netherlands. Their final position was 22nd of 35 teams, a notable achievement for a small country.

The Women's team scored good wins against Poland, Scotland, Norway, Croatia and Denmark, though struggling to find consistent form. The two Seniors teams also produced a mixed bag but thoroughly enjoyed competing against European luminaries of yesteryear.

The event ended, for Wales, more or less as it had started, with Gilly Clench and her 7-year-old daughter Melanie standing disconsolately at the check-in desk while the rest of us boarded the flight for Cardiff. The tour company had overbooked the flight, and only one seat remained. The weary duo finally arrived home at 5 o'clock the following morning.

The Welsh Bridge Union has decided to appoint a Chief Executive to manage its day-to-day business and to relieve elected officers and appointees of some of their routine work.

Familiarity with bridge administration and the requirements of a National Bridge Organisation is essential. Applicants will also need to be willing and able to work from home.

It is envisaged that the role of the Chief Executive will include strategic direction, coordination of the activities of Officers and appointees, policy formulation, management of the business of the Union, promotion of bridge and the obtaining and retaining of sponsorship.

The fee will be in the region of £3000 a year for at least $1 \frac{1}{2}$ days a week.

Obituary: Menna Roberts

Many people will miss Menna Roberts who died in April after a long illness, faced with great courage. We shall miss her decorous presence at the Bridge table, and her many friends will miss her wisdom and her sense of fun.

Menna learned to play Bridge in Africa where she and her husband, Hywel, lived for many years. On their return they bought a house on her beloved island of Anglesey, but stayed in Penrhyndeudraeth during the week from which base Hywel carried out his duties as Chief Warden of Snowdonia. During the evenings they began teaching Bridge to people in Penhryn who soon formed a club of their own.

In the early seventies they were founder members of the first affiliated Bridge club on Anglesey, in Llangefni. After many years, numbers began to decline, so Menna and Hywel started Bridge lessons again. It was Menna's idea to move the club to Menai Bridge in 1987, and we soon had a thriving club. After Hywel's death Menna organised more lessons and, again, new players emerged to swell the numbers.



In 1996 Menna was a founder member of a club in Benllech where there was already a number of players, and these new members were gently introduced to rules required of an affiliated club. Menna taught Bridge to many people on an entirely voluntary basis. love of the game motivated her, and her skills as a communicator made her an excellent promoter of the game of She took part in all the Bridge. national events for many years and represented North Wales several times in the Spickett Bowl competition. Whenever there was work to be done at a Bridge event, Menna could always be relied on to help. Indeed, she gave her usual quiet, valuable help in the running of the last Camrose event held in North Wales, in spite of feeling ill. Founder of four clubs; teacher to many; hard worker for the Bridge scene, Menna has certainly left her mark in North Wales. I shall miss a bright, feisty and very good friend. Indeed. we shall all miss Menna. She was a fine player and a very fine person.

Online Master Points

The EBU have instituted Online bridge in which players can earn a new type of masterpoint called Online Master Points. The EBU will accept these Online Points towards promotions, although with the proviso that no more than a third of the points for any promotion may be Online Points. The WBU has a reciprocity arrangement with the EBU for normal master points, but these new points are outside the agreement, so the Executive had to decide whether or not we would accept Online Points earned by our members, and whether they will similarly count towards promotions.

The first difficulty which will need to be overcome is the inability of the existing WBU masterpoint software to take account of the one-third rule. Council also has some concerns about the security of the environment in which Online masterpoints are earned.

The Welsh Bridge Union has therefore decided that for the time being, Online points will not be accepted until such concerns can be dealt with. In the meantime, members should store their Online points until further notice.

WBU Directing Courses

Courses for aspiring Club and Tournament Directors are arranged from time to time by Ken Richardson, the WBU's Tournament Direction Coordinator. Courses are subsidised by the Union and a nominal fee charged to participants. The recent A and B courses at Gwent Academy attracted 31 participants.

There will be a further 'A' course on Saturday 13th October with a 'B' course on Sunday 14th, both in Colwyn Bay. The next WBU 'C' course will be in the spring, date and venue yet to be decided.

Master Point of View

Have any of you watched "The West Wing"? (I think it's a great programme). In one episode all the high-powered executives in The White House were making sure that they didn't celebrate too early and so tempt fate. This amused me, but I should have learned from it and not said in the last newsletter that no points had been lost in the post during the year-end. Almost immediately I had a phone call. After sending in points for herself and her husband, a member had received back only her empty SAE. I thought I must have had a dotty moment until I checked my book and found I had never had any points from her. Later some of her points were found somewhere and returned to her by the Post Office (but not her husband's, those seem to have vanished for ever). Later again, I received her original letter to me. It was separated from its envelope but had been delivered because my address was at the top. Obviously her letter had been eaten by a Post Office machine. Fortunately in the end I managed to sort it all out and enter the points in time for the year-end. I now echo The West Wing actors in "Don't tempt fate", pity I don't get thousands of dollars each time I say the line.

Occasionally someone phones enquiring about their points, and I say "I posted them to you some time ago." I often wonder if when they turn up later, anyone ever thinks I was fibbing and had just forgotten about them (impossible with my mail book system!). I was prompted to wonder once again "Where do these letters go?" when on 18th June 2001, points I had posted on 21st October 2000 finally arrived on the member's doormat. (the dates are right, but I'm guessing about the doormat.)

I suppose we are used to letters going astray, even if we do not like it, but I did have a surprising "first" recently: this was a message saying "I'm not entitled to these points." Usually it is me upsetting people by having to tell them that.

You can also upset people when directing, but not so the other evening when I was called for an opening lead from the wrong hand. The declarer had already realised that her partner had put her into an impossible contract and when I told her that one of her options was to have the contract played from the other hand she was delighted to tell her partner "You can play this."

Now that the WBU Journal for the year has been published I expect the usual calls from people unable to reconcile the information on their master point card with their Journal entry, so perhaps an explanation here will help (those with an historical bent might like to know one also appears in the Newsletter for Autumn 1994). The Journal entry for a player gives two numbers, the first being the player's Local points (divided by one hundred) added to their Green (National) points, whilst the second is a separate total of all the Green points included in the overall total. However on the Master Point Registration card, as some ranks require specific numbers of Green points, the Local and Green points are recorded separately, and not totalled together. To add to the confusion, each Green point, of course is equivalent to 100 locals.

Apart from problems with points, I could easily have problems with my own identity. At a recent congress I found myself down as "Nora" and despite my protests in various Newsletters I still get letters to "Noel" (that's masculine!) or "Dear Sir" and even "Esquire". Quite a surprise for a grandmother. Laura Woodruff, the NTO. and new [temporary. Ed] newsletter editor, told me she is also sometimes called "Nora", and we could be "Flipping Nora" and "Nora Batty". I leave to you which of us is which, but I must say I don't wear stockings.

Val Kennewell has retired as Membership Secretary and Newsletter editor. I enjoyed working with her and shall miss exchanging emails. She says she probably won't get any emails now. How sad.


