He became a familiar figure to many Welsh and English players as he sat quietly beside her whilst she played.

Arvon was my friend, and when I think of him, what I first see in my mind is the friendly smile he had for everyone. Players like Arvon seem unassuming but form the backbone of the bridge world, the pleasure they show in playing helps to give a welcome to newcomers to the game. He will be missed for a long time.

The WBU website can be found at <a href="https://www.wbu.org.uk">www.wbu.org.uk</a> Usage has gone up since the makeover, and the site currently receives 2500 visits per month. Two points are raised by members time and again; set out below are the problems and the solutions.

- 1. The results listing is jumbled.

  <u>Solution</u> press refresh on your browser This reloads the page stored on your ISP's server, usually the results untangle themselves.
- 2. The latest results aren't there.

  Solutions sometimes they aren't we do depend on the organisers to
  pass them on to us, and for the most
  part they do. The results of
  congresses in South Wales are usually
  posted within 24 hours but most ISPs
  don't come searching the site every
  time you ask them, they save a copy

for the first request & then show that copy to subsequent users – it depends on which ISP you use as to how frequently the copies are updated. Pressing CTRL-refresh on your browser can overcome this, however it doesn't always work, but you might succeed by keying in the website address without the 3 leading Ws, i.e. wbu.org.uk

- Select MEMBERS from the red menu at the left hand side of the screen and about halfway down the page which then displays you will see the following:-

- Click on the "here" at the end of the sentence.
- You will then see a list of the WBU ID numbers, in alphanumerical order, of those whose master points have been received by me, with the status of their MP claim, i.e. when the points were received or posted back, etc. If you cannot find yourself in the list, after

# **Introducing Bridge In Welsh Schools (enthusiasm reaps rewards)**

The number of Welsh club members under the age of 25 is small; Wales was barely able to field a team at the recent European Youth Championships at Torquay even by importing players living in England but of Welsh parentage. In contrast the EBU website shows that with full-time paid staff supported by volunteers, Junior bridge prospers with training courses, competitions and active schools participation. To remedy this, a pilot exercise has taken place entirely with volunteers involving over 12 schools, mainly in West Wales. Children take readily to bridge. Average club players with no special qualifications or Master Point holdings make the best tutors provided they have enthusiasm and the motivation to put something back into the game we all enjoy.

School transport arrangements mean that extra-curricular activities take place mainly in lunch breaks, and initially tuition sessions will have to fit. Experience favours starting with MiniBridge (a form of bridge without bidding), with progression to the full game as soon as the basics are secure. Fastest progress flows where, as in one school (Ffynone House) a teacher has devoted time daily to introduce her hobby of bridge to her pupils two competed at Torquay. In state schools teacher involvement is less likely, although at Bishopston Comprehensive 4 teachers learn alongside pupils. While pupils at primary schools derive great benefit, there is little point in teaching there unless the secondary school to which they will advance already has

a bridge club. Moreover where availability of volunteers is limited, resources are best devoted to the 13-and-above age group where concentration and assimilation levels are more advanced.

Introducing bridge to schools brings together the very real educational and wider benefits to pupils and the long-term interests of bridge in Wales. There will be a wealth of enthusiasts out there happy to invest a little of their time to this rewarding end (sadly it is necessary to mention that all volunteers must expect to be vetted in police paedophile records). Time-saving detailed documentation outlining approaches to Directors of Education and Head Teachers (personal contacts are best) is available together with full guidance on introduction of MiniBridge etc. A synopsis has already been sent to each Area in the hope that the exercise may be extended, strengthening bridge throughout Wales with participation by young players and with it the long term lowering of the average age of Club members. Areas may consider appointing co-ordinators and clubs may invite volunteers to assist. Those interested are welcome to contact me direct to talk through methods, not least shortcuts for quick results ideally starting in the Autumn term.

The Welsh Schools Championships take place at Swansea Bridge Club on the afternoon of Saturday 23rd November at 2.00 pm. Please contact me. If there is sufficient demand a MiniBridge competition can be arranged the same afternoon.

# **Orange Book Changes**

Since publication of the Orange Book 1998, a number of corrections and additions have been made. The EBU Laws & Ethics Committee conducts an annual review of permitted conventions, and invites applications for authorisation of new conventions. The changes arising from the 2002 annual review are shown below. They will come into force on 1st September 2002.

# **International Round-up**

# European Championships, 16<sup>th</sup>-29<sup>th</sup> June 2002 Salsomaggiore Terme

The Welsh team of Adrian Thomas, Paul Denning, Filip Kurbalija, Tim Rees, Patrick Jourdain and Tony Ratcliff competed against 37 other European nations in the championships, held in Salsomaggiore Terme, Italy. The team was accompanied by Jim Luck as non-playing captain and Laura Woodruff as scorer and coach. The trip was not



without its difficulties: the minibus booked to take the team from the airport to Salsmaggiore failed to materialise, the Po valley was experiencing a staggering, unexpected heatwave, the hotel staff, mysteriously, didn't quite grasp the importance of the England-Denmark World Cup match, for which the team had arrived with 30 seconds to spare, and the minibus was again missing for the return journey. Nevertheless Wales triumphed over these setbacks to score a number of notable wins against strong teams such as Poland, Russia, Sweden and Belgium.

Your editor returned from the trip exhausted by the effort of translating entire restaurant menus into English for Filip and negotiating with uncooperative car-hire companies. Italy's premature exit from the important event of the fortnight (the World Cup) was compensated for by a record  $5^{th}$  successive win in the bridge event, their gold medal assured with three rounds to go.

# Commonwealth Nations Bridge Championships 16<sup>th</sup>-20<sup>th</sup> July 2002, Manchester

This was the first Commonwealth championship, staged as a prelude to the Commonwealth games, and attracted an impressive 30 teams from around the world. Wales was represented by Filip Kurbalija, Tim Rees, Adam Dunn, Peter Goodman, Dafydd Jones and Gary Jones, with Jim Luck again bravely undertaking the role of NPC. In the round-robin stage, Wales came back from an apparently impossible position with excellent wins against Uganda, South Africa, Pakistan, Bermuda and Malaysia (with a little help from Guernsey, who beat the Australians 22-8) to make up 22 VPs against the Antipodeans and take one of the four semi-final places.

The arrangement of groups meant that the two teams sponsored by the Maple Financial Group and Brigitte Mavromichalis, who were ineligible for medal places, played each other, so the semi-final match between Wales and Canada became the gold-medal encounter.

The strong Canadian team led after the first two stanzas by 27 IMPs, and gained a further 10 IMPs in the next set of twelve boards to lead by 37 going into the final set. This proved to be a thriller, with Wales bidding a good slam and a game contract missed in the other room, and closing the gap to 24, 19, 17, 11 and 8 as the match progressed. For those in the Vu-Graph theatre this was real theatre. Sadly, the match was too short for victory and despite a gain of another IMP on the final board, the Canadians held out to take the gold. We can, however, take pride in a great recovery by the team, and a silver medal for players.

# Nations Cup, 8<sup>th</sup>-9<sup>th</sup> May 2002, Stadthalle Bonn-Bad Godesberg

The Welsh team of Peter Goodman, Adam Dunn, Adrian Thomas and Mike Pownall took 4<sup>th</sup> place from eighteen strong European teams in this prestigious event, missing the head-to-head final by a whisker when Austria scored a big win in the final match of the round-robin. Wales finished over a match ahead of the fancied English team.

# Amstelveen International Bridge Team Tournament, 31st May-2nd June 2002

Peter Goodman, John Salisbury, Patrick Jourdain and Tony Ratcliff achieved 8<sup>th</sup> place in the Schiphol invitation tournament, a good enough finish to earn an invitation for next year.

# **Cambria Plate Final**

It is small honour to play in the Cambria Plate for some of us. Admitting to having been knocked out in the first round is more than some can bear. For my team the prospect dawned of a match in the Gagnes' house complete with their renowned hospitality. With Tom Reddy and John Glubb in my team I had reservations about our chances, but I knew we would enjoy ourselves.

In the first set of eight a massive swing came from this hand:-

East opened a weak

In one room, East opened a weak 2♠ and was raised to 4♠ doubled, making. At the other table South was declarer in 5♠ doubled, also making on a spade lead: a swing of 1640. Splendid card that ♣J. Good news for my team, and an aggregate of +780.

A couple of horror shows on the next set. Holding ★Axxx, ♥1098x, ♦ void, ♣AQJxx, I open 1♣ (could be 2 cards in a weak NT hand) and raise partner's 1♥ to 2♥. Passed out. What a wimp I was: 3♥ should be automatic. Game missed, bid in the other room.

Set three – time for bravery. Partner opens 1NT (12-14). Do you move on?

- $\spadesuit \ x \ x \ x \ x$
- ♥ QJxx
- **♦** x x
- **♣** A K x

Possibly a bit undisciplined, but a major suit fit might be profitable, for you hold good cards. If partner bids 2♦ you will wish you

had passed 1NT. I ventured 2. Stayman and raised 2. to 3. which got us to the cold but undeserved 4. We are now 2300 in the lead. There are mutterings from (some of) the opposition that it's time to call it a day.

Set four and partner opens 1NT (12-14). You hold AJ9xxx,  $\forall xx$ ,  $\forall void$ , AQJxx. You transfer to A and continue with A. Over partner's 3NT my seasoned view is you should now bid A. I didn't, but bid A. Opposite, partner held A10x, A4Qx, A4Kxxx. They bid A4 in the other room.

With two sets to go we are a comfortable 2220 in the lead. Then for the horror show.

Partner opens  $2\clubsuit$  game force. Holding  $\spadesuit Qxx$ ,  $\blacktriangledown xxx$ ,  $\spadesuit xxx$ ,  $\clubsuit AJxx$  I responded  $2\spadesuit$  and Tom bid  $3\spadesuit$ , a very good hand with diamonds. I raise to  $4\spadesuit$  and over  $4\blacktriangledown$  bid  $5\clubsuit$ . He now jumps to  $6\spadesuit$  and the hand on my left leads an intermediate spade. In dummy is:

- ♠ KJxx
- ♥ A K 10
- ♦ AKQxxx
- ♣ void

Why I decided to play the AJ is between me and my maker. If I play small, RHO rises with the ace to give his partner a non-existent ruff and the spades being 2-4 I make a contract which, left to my own devices, I would have gone off in: the diamonds were 3-1 so I can't ruff a 4th spade. Vulnerable too. Then in another vulnerable slam my partner forgot to count the trumps and pull them. Masses of points out, thousands. All of a sudden we are only 200 up with eight boards to go. It's hairy stuff this aggregate scoring.

A sweaty final eight boards saw us triumph (!) by 170.

All my team, and I'm sure the opposition, look back on a match and think about the mistakes. In all my years of playing bridge there are very few times when I have seen brilliance. But I've seen very many simple mistakes. Seen them, done them myself. It's a simple game, most of the time.

# The jewels in the crown By Peter Goodman


As in any long bridge tournament, all the Welsh players at the Commonwealth Nations Bridge Championship had their moments of glory and others of shame. This time, the former far outweighed the latter and allowed us to take the silver medal after a nail-biting semi-final medal contest against Canada.

A key match in the round-robin stage was a double-header against the favoured Australian team, who must have been disappointed not to win a medal after holding an apparently unassailable position.

When the Australian pair held the hand East opened 1♥ (Mosquito Club) showing four spades and 11-16 HCP. West had to bid 1NT forcing, and it proved too difficult to locate the double fit so they settled in 4♠.

For Wales, Peter as East opened 1♠ and Adam bid 2♠ natural and game forcing. Peter jumped to 3♥, a splinter showing 5431 shape with extra values or a non-minimum 6421 or 5521 hand. Adam now bid 3♠ showing 3-card support and Peter bid 4♠ to emphasise the good support. Adam was now able to bid 4NT over which Peter's 5♠ showed 2 of the 5



aces and  $\blacklozenge$ Q. At this stage there was no hand Peter could hold (unless  $3 \lor$  was a poor bid!) that didn't include the  $\blacklozenge$ Q so Adam could count either  $6 \spadesuit$ ,  $1 \lor$ ,  $4 \diamondsuit$ ,  $1 \clubsuit$  and  $1 \lor$  ruff or  $5 \spadesuit$ ,  $1 \lor$ ,  $5 \diamondsuit$ ,  $1 \clubsuit$  and a club ruff. The good  $7 \diamondsuit$  gained us 16 IMPs.

The semi-final against Canada brought another grand slam gain, this time for Dafydd and Gary:

(\*Bid something sensible!)  $\blacktriangle$ 10 was led; Gary ruffed two clubs in dummy and discarded a third on the  $\blacktriangle$ A for 13 tricks. The contract is solid even on a trump lead, with diamonds 4-3 for a club discard on  $\blacklozenge$ Q.

A demonstration by Tim Rees of his fine card play brought Wales to a tantalising glimpse of victory in the final set.

With Canada stopping in 3. Tim's bold overcall of 4. over East's 1NT offered the chance of a gain. The contract must seemingly fail with a spade, a heart and two diamonds to lose. But when West followed the VK lead with a diamond switch, East's play of the ace let Tim draw trumps, win the return and play off his remaining trumps to squeeze East in the minors. A club switch at trick two, or a brave duck of the actual diamond switch by East, would have left South short of an entry to his club menace.

# The force of temporal power

By our special correspondent in the Far West

At the time of the incident that I am about to describe, I had been a keen Duplicate Bridge player for 35 years. Soon after I retired in 1995 from a successful professional career, I was working in my field at home with my son and was carrying an aluminium ladder but sadly I failed to notice the power cables 20 feet above me. Even if I had noticed I was not unduly worried as I had assumed that they were well insulated (a serious mistake). The inevitable happened, the ladder momentarily touched the cables and I received a 12,000 volts shock as the current shorted through the ladder, through me to the ground. I went down like a sack of potatoes and woke up in hospital in a very confused state 3 weeks later.



I later found out that what had transpired was that my son ran back up to the house and raised the alarm, my wife (now ex-) called all the emergency services and rushed down to where I was, found me not breathing with no heart beat and rapidly going blue and gave me mouth to mouth resuscitation until the arrived emergency services which was fortunately no more than 10 minutes. Clinically I was dead during this period. My wife fortuitously knew how to do mouth to mouth resuscitation from training that was required to get a Austrian Driving Licence we were posted to Vienna for 3 years in the '80s. The ambulance personnel very quickly gave me the electric shock treatment (!) to restart my heart which amazingly leapt back into life on the first attempt and I restarted breathing. I was rushed off the hospital and into Intensive Care where I remained in a critical condition for 2 weeks.

As a result of this accident I had incurred a considerable degree of brain damage though Oxygen starvation so when I woke up my short term memory was minimal and I had initially lost the memory of the previous 20 years of my life though most of this long term memory came back within the first 30 days with a lot of prompting from my family. The only other physical damage was limited burns to the underneath of my toes on both feet where the current had burn holes through the soles of my rubber boots to get to earth.

What followed was 2 years of hell with brain damage and loss of self-confidence but with hindsight I can say that my short-term memory was steadily improving. However the one thing that was unaffected was my Bridge and with this I had no problem! So I located the local clubs and within 3 months of the accident started playing duplicate minimum twice a week and with a considerable degree of success once I had established regular partners. So much so that within a further 6 months I actually headed the Individual Performance Ladder out of 60 regular members of the local club that was posted each week.

At the end of 2 years I endured the stress of divorce and I escaped the M25 and moved to Pembrokeshire by which time my memory and hence self-confidence was much improved and within a year of living down here I became aware that my memory and previous brain power was fully restored and I have never looked back! I am quite certain that (though I say it myself) my remarkable recovery is largely due to playing a great deal of serious Bridge over this period which stimulated the brain to restore the connections with the result that the only thing lost is any memory of those 3 weeks following the accident.

I now play duplicate 3 nights a week in 3 different bridge clubs in the locality and I am the director of two of them. In the winter I also teach bridge on a 4th evening!




